

1000 Books Before Kindergarten Parents Packet





Dear parents,

Welcome to the Ouachita Parish Public Library's 1000 Books Before Kindergarten Program! Reading to your child is one of the most powerful ways to boost his or her brain power. The simple act of sharing books helps your child learn pre-reading skills such as understanding the sounds letters make, developing a bigger vocabulary, and building background knowledge – all important skills that help prepare your child for learning to read. Your child will be better prepared for kindergarten.

Ouachita Parish Public Library's 1000 Books Before Kindergarten program is a fun, exciting, and free way to start your child on the path to success! Any child under the age of 6 can participate. Just follow these steps:

1. **Register.** Register online at www.oplib.org or at any branch. Read the digital materials, print it at home, or pick it up at the Library.
2. **Track Reading.** Record every book you read to your child online.
3. **Every Book Counts.** Even if your child wants to hear the same book again and again, you can count it each time. You can also count the books your child hears in story time, in daycare or preschool, or with a friend or family member, as long as your child listens to the entire book.
4. **100 Book Milestones.** Each time you read 100 books, come to the Library to receive a special sticker.
5. **1000 Book Milestone.** You did it! Come celebrate at the Library, and receive a free book.
6. **Keep on Reading.** Don't stop at 1000! Keep on reading together. There's always more learning ahead.

Singing songs, saying rhymes, telling stories, and playing with your child are all great ways to build literacy skills. Visit the Ouachita Parish Public Library often for free, fun, and educational programs for your little one and to find great books to share with your child.

One thousand books may seem like a lot, but if you read just one book a night, you'll meet your goal in less than 3 years. If you read three books a night, you could reach your goal in just one year! Ask our friendly staff for suggestions – we're here to help you on your journey to 1000 Books Before Kindergarten.

20 Ways to Raise a Book-Smart Baby

1. Read to your child daily from birth on. Read several times during the day, even if it's for just a few minutes at a time.
2. When your baby begins to handle his own books, give him board books with heavy pages, rounded edges, and uncluttered pictures. Around 12 months, share lift-the-flap books for peekaboo experiences. When toddlers are ready, choose books with paper pages and just one or two sentences per page.
3. Invite your toddler to help pick out books. And yes, it's good to read her favorites over and over again, as she will begin to recognize words.
4. Talk about the pictures – both illustrations and photographs. Ask simple “what” questions, point to words occasionally, and eventually let your child help turn pages.
5. Do not attempt to teach your child to read. (No drilling or memorizing!) Your reading experiences together should always be fun.
6. When your baby makes sounds, imitate them. After repeating his sounds a few times, make new sounds for him to imitate.
7. Talk to your child during everyday activities and daily routines. Introduce new and unusual words to her.
8. Provide experiences that allow you to introduce new words to your child. For example, at the zoo or on a farm you can introduce animals names and sounds; on a nature walk, introduce plant and insect names.
9. When you are at a store, the post office, a restaurant, or any other public place, point to words on the signs that are everywhere and read them to your child.
10. Read, sing, and chant nursery rhymes with your child. Make up motions to go with the rhymes.
11. Share finger and hand rhymes, toe and foot rhymes, and bounce rhymes daily, like “This Little Piggy.” If you don't know any, you can always make them up. Your child will love the interaction.
12. Sing songs with your child every day. Don't worry about tune – your child doesn't care!
13. Sing songs slowly so your child can hear the different sounds that make up each word.
14. Sing songs that are silly and that play with language, such as “This Old Man,” “Hickory Dickory Dock,” and “Skinnamarink.” Make up new songs, and sing them to familiar tunes. Add motions.
15. Share all kinds of music styles with your child, and let him play simple instruments like rattles.
16. Share stories with your child. Tell her stories about your family, things that happened during the day, and even made-up stories about her favorite toys.
17. Share wordless books with your child, telling the story from the pictures.
18. Turn off the TV, and play with your child every day. The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends no television for children younger than two years.
19. Provide play materials and experiences that encourage the imagination, such as water play, sand play, play dough, blowing bubbles, scribbling, and pretend play.
20. When grandparents, relatives, or friends ask for gift suggestions, recommend books!
