

FREE BOOK GIVEAWAY FOR KIDS AND TEENS FOR ONE DAY ONLY!


To celebrate Read Across America Day on Wednesday, March 2, the Library will give away free books to kids and teens who have Ouachita Parish Public Library cards. No matter if they've had a Library card for years or if they sign up on March 2, all kids and teens who have a card are eligible to receive a free book to keep. Books will be available at all branches only on

March 2, while supplies last. Children and teens ages 16 and under must have a parent or legal guardian register the card for them. To register your child for a Library card, simply fill out a form at any branch and bring proof of identity and proof of address.

# AUTHOR INTERVIEW

Dr. Shalanda Stanley, Author of Drowning Is Inevitable & Nick and June Were Here

#### What are some of your favorite authors and As an author who writes for teens, do you why do you enjoy their work? think they should be reading more and why is it important that they be avid readers?

I've had different favorite writers at different times in my life. When I was in elementary school my favorite writer was Beverly Cleary. I loved Ramona, Beezus, and Henry like they were members of my own family. As I grew older, I transitioned to Judy Blume. For every life struggle in my adolescent life, there was a Judy Blume book to guide me through it. Then I took a weird turn and strictly read Stephen King and V.C. Andrews. Pet Sematary and Flowers *in the Attic* TRAUMATIZED me, but I kept going back for more. For a palate cleanser, I read Francine Pascal's Sweet Valley High Series. I so desperately wanted to be a Jessica but was for sure an Elizabeth. Other favorites of mine are Lois Lowry, Kate DiCamillo (She writes middle grade in a way that I aspire to), Adam Silvera, John Corey Whaley, Angie Thomas, Nic Stone, Ashley Elston, Justina Ireland, Jeff Zentner, and on and on.

### What inspired you to write for teen readers as opposed to adults?

I think some of the most complex and elaborate storytelling happens in children's books. I've often said the younger your audience, the better writer you must be. This is probably why I've not been brave enough to dive into Middle Grade. I love writing YA specifically because teenagers are honest in a way that adults can't be. They feel things in a way that adults can't feel them. When I think about what I love about the characters I've written is that they mean what they say. Teenagers don't say things they don't mean. When my main character, Olivia from *Drowning Is Inevitable*, tells her best friend, "I'll do anything for you." She means it in a way that an adult doesn't. She would do ANYTHING for her friend. I'm not saying that is a good thing, but that kind of blind devotion is so fun to write and of course, to read about.



YES! I think reading widely and often is important because books are how we keep learning and widening our world view. Books take us places we've never been, push us to think in ways we've never thought, teach us about humanity and truth, allow us to escape. Reading has saved people's lives. Reading books connects us not only to the text but to each other.

### If you were to recommend any book to a reader, what would that book be and why?

Any book? Just one book? I think everyone should read, at some point in their lives, Never Let Me Go by Kazuo Ishiguro. This book does so much, that you don't realize it at first. It's a book about clones and society and what makes someone important and why they're important. I'm a huge fan of last lines and this book's last line gutted me. It was so quietly delivered, that you don't feel the punch until later, but then it hits hard.

### What is your best advice for budding writers?

Read and read a lot. There are no "bad" books, no girl books, no boy books. There are just books. Read whatever you want to read. Read, read, read. You cannot be a good writer if you do not read good writing. And you should probably write a little, too. Don't think your writing needs to be perfect. Embrace revision. Revision is where the magic happens. If you are someone who thinks they get it right the first time and nothing needs to be changed, please trust me and this hard truth: The work is not as good as you think it is. Revise it.





The Louisiana Digital Library (LDL) is an online library containing over 400,000 photographs, maps, manuscripts, books, oral histories and other materials that document Louisiana's history and culture. Currently 28 libraries, museums, archives, historical groups and other institutions from across the state contribute materials to the LDL.

### **Ouachita Parish Public Library** contributes six collections to the LDL:

- Camp Schools is a collection of over 100 items pertaining to the history of **Ouachita Parish Schools.**
- The Fifth District Works Progress Administration collection contains 222 scans of draft notes from the Fifth District Office of the Federal Writer's Project. These notes were transferred to the Ouachita Parish Public Library when the project ended.

- The smallest collection is the Stan Shlosman Reveille Seven collection. Mr. Shlosman was one of the seven Louisiana State University students who was expelled when they refused to allow Huey Long to censor the student newspaper after he objected to an editorial.
