Her Royal Spyness by Rhys Bowen

Her Royal Spyness is a great cozy mystery and the first book in the Royal Spyness series by Rhys Bowen. The series is set in the 1930's, predominately in Great Britain, and is well researched with just enough historical accuracy to make these works of fiction believable.

Lady Georgiana Charlotte Eugenie is 34th in line to the British Crown—and penniless. Her brother Binky, her sister-in-law Fig, and even her friend and confidante Queen Mary suggest she marry a member of European royalty to fix her money woes but Georgia has other plans. Each book has a mystery for her to solve. This one has Georgia finding a body in her bathtub and sleuthing to clear Binky of the crime. The books have wonderful characters that are developed throughout the series and are light enough for a pleasant, fun read.





LEONIDAS BARKDULL FAULK

It has been over 100 years since Leonidas Barkdull Faulk gave his life on the World War I battlefield in France, but his name and a few of his letters still exist to tell the story of his bravery and sacrifice. Barkdull Faulk Elementary School is named for Barkdull Faulk. A bronze memorial tablet was presented to Monroe City High School by the 1919 graduating class and moved to Barkdull Faulk Elementary when the school was built. American Legion Post 13 on Forsythe Avenue was also named for Barkdull Faulk, a young Monroe physician who volunteered for service in the United States Army. Copies of some his letters have been added to the Louisiana Digital Library in the Leonidas Barkdull Faulk World War I Collection.

Leonidas Barkdull Faulk was born on November 21, 1889 to Robert Williams "R.W." Faulk and Florence Stratton Barkdull Faulk. Barkdull graduated from Monroe City School in 1907 and Tulane Medical School in 1912. Both Barkdull's father and his mother's father were doctors. Barkdull interned in New Orleans before returning to Monroe to live with his wife Pauline and their son, Robert Guy, and to practice medicine with his father.

The British army was helping fight against Germany when they invaded France, and they needed servicemen, especially those trained in medical fields. Barkdull volunteered and was commissioned a lieutenant in the Medical Corps on June 20, 1917. Between September 1917 and March 1918, Barkdull wrote a series of letters to his father in which he discussed his work with the wounded, the war effort, and his concern and love for his family. His wife was notified by letter on April 4, 1918, that her husband was "Wounded and a Prisoner." Dr. R.W. Faulk tried to find out more from the British Embassy, from his 5th District Congressman, and from the American Red Cross, but there was no definite information. In February of 1919, Agatha, Dr. R. W. Faulk's daughter, wrote to her father about a visit she had with Captain Maxson when she was in Baltimore, Maryland. Capt. Maxson had talked with a priest who was at the scene of action and had information on Barkdull's final act

of heroism. An enemy bomb injured Barkdull so that he was unable to retreat. The fighting was heavy, endangering those who were trying to carry him to safety, so he sent them on ahead. It is speculated that the first injury was what resulted in the "Wounded and Prisoner" status. According to the priest, there was a second bomb which killed Barkdull.

Barkdull Faulk, the 28-year-old doctor and soldier is listed on the Tablets of the Missing at the Somme American Cemetery in Picardie France as: Faulk, Leonidas B. First Lieutenant, U.S. Army attached to British Army, died March 24, 1918.
