GET A LIFE, CHLOE BROWN BY TALIA HIBBERT


After almost dying, Chloe Brown comes up with several directives to help her "Get a


MADAM C.J. WALKER

FALL IN LOVE WITH E-BOOKS

Long-time patron Vanessa reads dozens of books each year. She usually reads print books, but began downloading more e-books during the pandemic.

? WHY HAVE YOU READ MORE E-BOOKS THAN PRINT BOOKS RECENTLY?

The closure of the Library and limited access during the pandemic steered me online more. I am so grateful to the Library for increasing the number of offerings available online this year as well as continuing to have print books available for those who prefer to touch paper.

? WHAT ARE YOUR THOUGHTS ON THE LIBRARY HAVING E-BOOKS AVAILABLE TO BORROW?

Love it! I love the path my Ouachita Parish Public Library is on with making virtual offerings available to us all. But more than that, I love that the Library makes both online and print offerings available. They meet people where they are and that is what I most appreciate.

? WHY IS READING SO IMPORTANT TODAY?

I have always been a “knowledge is power” kind of person and that has remains true especially this year. For our mental health, we need to let our minds wander to other things and other places sometimes. We need to experience other things and walk in other people’s shoes. Reading helps us to do that. Reading also increases our vocabulary and introduces us to ideas and concepts we might not have been familiar with. That certainly happened to me this year with some of the books we read in my book clubs.



? WHAT WOULD YOU SAY TO SOMEONE WHO IS HESITANT TO TRY E-BOOKS?

It is so worth it. People may think it’s hard to get set up and hard to get online. If you can’t get set up, someone from the Library can help. People that know me know I am an advocate of checking to see if the Library has it first before I buy the book or audiobook.

? IS THERE ANYTHING ELSE YOU’D LIKE TO ADD?



All you need is your Library card number and PIN number.

The Hoopla app not only lets you borrow e-books and e-audiobooks, but also music, movies and TV shows. You can borrow up to 7 items per calendar month on the Hoopla app. Hoopla is available to download on the Apple App Store and Google Play Store. Hoopla is also compatible with Kindle Fire and most smart TVs.



cloudLibrary™

The cloudLibrary app allows you to download both e-books and e-audiobooks with your Library card. Each Library card can download up to 5 items at a time on the cloudLibrary app. Download the cloudLibrary app on the Apple App Store or Google Play Store. CloudLibrary is also compatible with Nooks and Kindle Fires (fourth generation and up).

THE FAMILIARS BY STACEY HALLS

Fleetwood is with child again, though none of her previous pregnancies have borne fruit. She meets a midwife named Alice, who promises to help deliver a healthy baby. • **MAY 29, 1851**

Sojourner Truth gives her famous “**Ain’t I a Woman?**” speech at the Women’s Rights Convention in Akron, Ohio.

CONJURE WOMEN BY AFIA ATAKORA

Spanning eras and generations, *Conjure Women* tells of the lives of three unforgettable women: Miss May Belle, a wise healing woman; her precocious and observant daughter Rue, who is reluctant to follow in her mother’s footsteps as a midwife; and their master’s daughter Varina. *Available in print, large print and on cloudLibrary as an e-book and e-audiobook



• **SEPTEMBER 30, 1868**

Little Women by **Louisa May Alcott** 1868 is published, inspiring generations of women to come. The book has never been out of print.



THE BOOK OF LOST FRIENDS BY LISA WINGATE

The Book of Lost Friends is a story of three young women on a journey in search of family amidst the destruction of the post-Civil War South, and of a modern-day teacher who rediscovers their story and its connection to her own students’ lives. *Available in print, large print, book-on-CD and on cloudLibrary as an e-book and e-audiobook



• **FEBRUARY 1907**

Genie Layton is the first woman to vote in Ouachita Parish. A railroad tax was on the ballot. At this time in Louisiana, white women could only vote on property taxes if they owned property that would be affected.



• **MARCH 3, 1913**

On the eve of Woodrow Wilson’s inauguration, **suffragists march on Washington**. With an estimated crowd of 250,000 onlookers, some of the men blocked the route, hurled insults and spat on the women. When police failed to intervene, U.S. Army troops cleared the streets for the march to continue.

SAVING SAVANNAH BY TONYA BOLDEN

The daughter of upper-class African-American parents in 1919 D.C., Savannah lives luxuriously, with an elite education and her pick of a man. Suffocated by the structure of society, she meets Nell, a working-class girl who introduces her to the suffragette and socialist movements, inspiring her to fight for change. **Available in print, on cloudLibrary as an e-book and e-audiobook and on Hoopla as an e-audiobook*



• **AUGUST 18, 1920**

Tennessee ratifies the **19th Amendment**. With Tennessee being the 36th state to do so, the Amendment becomes law and ensures the right to vote could not be denied based on sex.



• **NOVEMBER 1920**

Florence Porter Barnes of Calhoun is the first woman to register to vote in Ouachita Parish after the 19th Amendment's ratification.



• **MAY 4, 1933**

Frances Perkins becomes the first female Cabinet member, appointed Secretary of Labor by President Franklin D. Roosevelt.



THE BOOK WOMAN OF TROUBLESOME CREEK BY KIM MICHELE RICHARDSON

A lonely Appalachian woman joins the Pack Horse Library Project and becomes a librarian, riding across slippery creek beds and up treacherous mountains on her faithful mule to deliver books to the impoverished hill people of Eastern Kentucky. **Available in print, large print, book-on-CD and on both cloudLibrary and Hoopla as an e-book and e-audiobook*

MANHATTAN BEACH BY JENNIFER EGAN

Anna works at the Brooklyn Naval Yard, where women hold jobs that once belonged to men, now soldiers abroad. She becomes the first female diver, the most dangerous of occupations, repairing ships that will help America win the war. With the atmosphere of a noir thriller, Manhattan Beach follows Anna into a world populated by gangsters, sailors, divers, bankers and union men. **Available in print, book-on-CD and on cloudLibrary as an e-book and e-audiobook*



• **JUNE 10, 1963**

Equal Pay Act is signed into law by President John F. Kennedy.



THE VANISHING HALF BY BRIT BENNETT

Weaving together multiple strands and generations of this family, from the Deep South to California, from the 1950s to the 1990s, The Vanishing Half is at once a riveting, emotional family story and a brilliant exploration of the American history of passing. Looking well beyond issues of race, the novel explores the lasting influence of the past as it shapes a person's decisions, desires, and expectations. **Available in print, large print and on cloudLibrary as an e-book and e-audiobook*



• **SEPTEMBER 21, 1981**

Sandra Day O'Connor is confirmed by the Senate to be the first woman to serve on the Supreme Court.

DON'T MISS READ ACROSS AMERICA DAY ON MARCH 2

To celebrate Read Across America Day on March 2, **the Library will give away free books to kids and teens who have Ouachita Parish Public Library cards.** No matter if they've had a Library card for years or if they sign up on March 2, all kids and teens who have a card are eligible to receive a free book to keep. Books will be available at all branches only on March 2, while supplies last.

Children and teens ages 16 and under must have a parent or legal guardian register the card for them. To register your child for a Library card, simply fill out a form at any branch and bring proof of identity and proof of address.

- Current driver's license (from any state),
- Current state-issued ID (from any state),
- Current military ID, OR
- Current passport (from any country)

PROOF OF ADDRESS EXAMPLES

- Current, postmarked piece of mail addressed to yourself,
- Printed checkbook with both name and current address,
- Auto registration with name and current address,
- Voter registration with name and current address,
- Report card with name and current address, OR
- Current lease agreement with name and current address

from the ARCHIVES

B.D. ROBINSON: MONROE'S ACTIVIST, EDUCATOR AND LEGEND

Bernie Dayton "B.D." Robinson is remembered by many in our region as an active leader in the Black community, dedicating his life to activism and education. The Ouachita Parish Public Library Genealogy and Special Collections department is home to resources that provide biographical information on some well-known Monroe residents, including Robinson. These documents help preserve the memory of this great man and many other people like him.

Born to sharecroppers on February 17, 1910 in Ouachita Parish, B.D.'s early life was dedicated to school. At age 14, he convinced his parents to allow him to leave Monroe to attend Straight College High School, a church-sponsored prep school in New Orleans, where he did janitorial work in exchange for room and board. B.D. went on to graduate from Dillard University in 1936. He wanted to be a doctor, but as he noted in the Library's biography file, "the Depression caught up with me." Instead, B.D. started his career in education. He taught math and science and coached basketball in Vernon, West Carroll, Madison and Ouachita Parishes. He was principal of J.S. Clark School from 1953-1974.* Ever the student, B.D. earned a Master of Arts from St. Louis University and completed advanced study at Atlanta University and Washington University in St. Louis, Missouri.

Seeing a gap in post-secondary educational opportunities for Black students, B.D. and Emily Robinson, his wife of 57 years, opened the Robinson Business College in 1944 and continued to operate the school until 1986.** The Library archival file of the school includes college catalogs, graduation programs and photographs that are integral to this piece of Monroe history.

In addition to his dedication to education, B.D. was an active community leader. Of note to the Library, he was integral in the establishment of the Carver Branch Library (now the Carver-McDonald Branch Library). The branch first opened in 1949 after a request from B.D. and the Colored Chamber of Commerce, as the Library system at this time was not integrated. Library services were first offered to the Black community out of Carroll

Auditorium. After B.D. helped raise thousands of dollars, the Library purchased and renovated a Selman Field barracks building for the Carver Branch.***

In 2001, B.D. was awarded the Monroe Chamber of Commerce's Silverstein Award for leading the fight for equality and registering to vote in 1939. He, Eluen Hoston, Alex Brown, E.W. Sims and H.H. Marbles were the first Black people to register to vote in Ouachita Parish after Reconstruction. Robinson was also active in the Ouachita Valley Council of Boy Scouts, the Highway Safety Commission, the Northeast Louisiana Sickle Cell Anemia Foundation and was appointed to the Monroe City Council to fill the term of the late Charles Johnson between 1994-1996.

B.D. died July 12, 2002, in Ouachita Parish. His life's work continues to impact generations of Ouachita Parish residents today.

Much of the information in this article was pulled from the Library's primary resources, including:

- A copy of B.D.'s funeral program, found in the African American Funeral Program Book. This book is in the Library's Genealogy Room and is accessible for reading during open hours.
- Biography files. These files contain historical and genealogical information, usually donated by the family or collected from various publications such as newspapers. They are also available in the Genealogy Room during open hours.
- Louisiana Digital Library. Ouachita Parish Public Librarians continually work to digitally preserve rare and historic photographs. The photos printed here are also available at www.louisianadigitallibrary.com.
